I am an award-winning author and illustrator with a whimsical, contemporary style, and I've had the joy of illustrating over 35 books published here and internationally, from picture books and baby board books to non-fiction and chapter books.

I work from my sunny studio in Sydney, surrounded by other lovely creative folks, many cups of dandelion tea, and my loyal studio assistant Paddington (a very professional Border Collie). There has genuinely never been a dessert I didn't like.

My most recent book, *The Letter Writer*, was published in May with Windy Hollow. I have a spooky-funny picture book coming out in August called *Stompie*, *the Zombie* with Amazon US. *It's a punny tale about a family of zombies with bold vivid illustrations*.

Right now, I'm working on a couple of secret projects, an exciting series with Hachette UK and a seriously lovely story for Penguin Australia. I can't say more yet, but I'm *very* excited.

I grew up in the countryside in a wildly creative home, my mum was an incredible artist, and we were always making things. We had an orchard, rambling gardens, and a parade of animals: four sheepdogs, two house dogs, casual cats, roaming horses, and a paddock full of sheep (plus a few snakes hiding under the steps). It was a childhood full of imagination and muddy adventures, and it absolutely shaped who I am.





As a kid, I was a typical illustrator-in-the-making: doodling on every available surface, drawing all over my schoolbooks, and, yes, being slightly competitive with friends about who was the *best* at drawing (shameful, but true!).

I took every creative subject I could in high school and university. I even started studying architecture, but there were far too many straight lines. I quickly switched to film, design, and illustration and never looked back.


My absolute favourite book growing up was *The Magic Faraway Tree* by Enid Blyton. I adored the quirky characters and the idea of strange lands rotating at the top of the tree, it sent my imagination into overdrive. Now, as a picture book creator, that's what I hope to do for children: create stories that feel magical and a little unexpected, that inspire play, art, or their own stories.



I'm Not Really Here by Gary Lonesborough

I'm Not Really Here is a story about an Aboriginal boy named Jonah who moves to a new country town with his dad and little brothers. He's also gay, dealing with body image issues, making new friends and falling in love, and coming to terms with his mother's death.

This was the quickest first draft I've written – I was able



to complete a first draft in just over a month. Once I got started, it felt like the story was just pouring out of me as it became more and more personal. I was really surprised when I began writing Jonah that he became a way to explore so many things about myself as a teen who was dealing with body image issues as well as the death of my own mother.

The setting of Patience is very much inspired by my hometown of Bega, NSW. I'd been wanting to set a book in my hometown, but I wanted to play with the geography too much that the town became fictional. I loved the way the town came together as a setting, though, as it also reflects my own relationship with the town now as an adult.

I'm incredibly proud of the final product as it feels like an extension of myself and what I wanted to say at the time. So many emotional moments in the book are palpable, rich with feeling, and I am so happy to have achieved that.

My favourite scenes to write were the flashback scenes as they are very much rooted in truth from my life, and I know readers will be able to connect with Jonah's story in a hundred different ways. ***GARY**



Saskia Spark-Lee loves animals – she's almost adopted a whole zoo-worth! But when Da and Dee say they can't add another to the collection, she must come up with a new plan to continue supporting her furry friends. With some help from Nanna, and the amazing fundraising skills of her friends, Saskia may find where there's a will, there's a way!

Creating your characters: The character of Saskia Spark-Lee is a little bit my childhood self, a little bit inspired by my daughter, and a little bit her very own person.

It took me a year of just thinking about Saskia, her family and friends before I wrote any of her stories. I wanted her to have a close family that she could rely on, I needed her to use her own sparks of independence, imagination, and determination with a good dash of bravery and kindness to solve her own problems. While she can be shy, and sometimes uncertain, Saskia can also be determined.

Planning plot: Fundraiser Fail is based on an experience from my childhood when my parents couldn't afford to pay for me to attend a school camp.

I was determined to go. With some help from my family, I made and sold toffees at school for 50c each. It got to a point where the kids would crowd around me when I arrived at school. My big ice cream tub of toffees would be gone in no time. I made over \$100 and went on that camp. It was a very proud moment for me. I wrote the fundraising element to give Saskia and her friends a challenge to overcome. Just like my daughter, Saskia has a big soft spot for helping animals. This seemed to be an excellent cause for Saskia and her friends to rally around.

Bio: Rebecka (Bec) Sharpe Shelberg is a children's author and librarian living on Dharug country (Western Sydney), in a neurodiverse household with her partner, three children and two floofy dogs. She firmly believes that stories and illustrations are the real magic in this crazy, confusing world. She loves love and kindness and really does want world peace.





Kate:

How to **Move a Zoo** was oodles of fun to research. We were lucky enough to visit the zoo's historical collection with Jean Rice from the Taronga Conservation Society. Jean showed us wonderful old photos and memorabilia such as tricycles for monkeys and decorative elephant headwear.

When researching a true story, sometimes you stumble across real gems of information, like the tiny sugar glider that travelled from Moore Park Zoo to Taronga in a zookeeper's pocket. But when things happened so long ago, it's not always possible to fill in all the blanks. Who saw the elephant walking past their

windows in the dawn light? What did Mr Miller say to Jessie as they walked through the streets? These questions and others were answered by our own imaginations. **~KATE**



Owen:

My grandma would sometimes describe things as being "as big as Jessie!" which shows what a huge place Jessie the elephant once held in the hearts of Sydneysiders. Jessie's story was brought to life for me through Kate's words and wonderful re-imagining of their journey across the city. I especially loved the kindly Mr Miller. It's the quiet rust he and Jessie have in each other that makes the story so special for me, and brings a tension to their

exciting (and true!) adventure.

Looking into local history was an adventure in itself – there is really no end to the amazing old photographs that can spark the imagination. I spent a lot of time happily lost in the City of Sydney Archives.

I also learnt a lot about elephants – firstly, that they are incredibly hard to draw! But by the end I'd fallen totally in love with them, not just with their magnificent appearance but also their loyalty, bravery, their dry sense of humour, and their patience with silly humans. ***OWEN**

Discovering beetles with Rhian Williams

My picture book, One Little Dung Beetle, is very beautifully illustrated by Heather Potter and Mark Jackson and published by Wild Dog Books.



When I was a little girl. I was intrigued by the fiddler beetles and rhinoceros beetles that I would find in my garden. Did you know, for its size, the rhinoceros beetle is the strongest animal in the world? One rhinoceros beetle can lift 850 times its own weight. If the average person was that strong, they could lift 10 elephants! You will find both these beetles in *One Little Dung Beetle*.

I learned lots of amazing things writing this book. Did you know we know about 500 types of native dung beetles in Australia - and there are still more to be discovered! There is even one, whose scientific name is Onthophagus mniszechi, that looks like a tiny triceratops dinosaur. You can spot that little beetle on the cover of *One Little Dung Beetle* and on the pages inside as well.

Beetles are very important ecosystem engineers - they help keep our environment healthy. Did you know that the descendants of a single ladybird beetle can, in one summer, eat nearly 200,000 of the aphids that would otherwise destroy garden plants. And they do this without leaving behind any harmful residues!

I had so much fun writing this book and I keep learning new things about beetles all the time. Did you know we have an Ironclad beetle in Australia known as the TimTam bug - because they look a bit like a squashed TimTam you can spot one on the end pages and inside the book too! Ironclad beetles have incredibly strong exoskeletons, and some can even survive being run over by a car. Scientists are investigating what makes them so tough and hope to use what they discover to make stronger materials for spacecraft.

I hope you have lots of fun reading *One Little Dung Beetle* and discovering your own favourite beetle! ~ *RHIAN*

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

Illustrating absolutely incredible beetles... with Heather Potter and Mark Jackson

What do we think about beetles and other insects? They're amazing, absolutely incredible, of course.



We are constantly taking small spiders and moths and flies and the occasional beetle that has ventured inside, back out again. Small brown beetles that are attracted to the light, and so active when the evening is still and muggy. We keep a huge magnifying glass in the kitchen drawer to use on these sorts of occasions.

There are some beetles in the book that we have never encountered in the wild, and some we never knew existed, like the strange, lumpy-looking Iron Clad Beetle, and the beautifully absurd Screech Beetle. We really did need to do some research first, so we quickly began gathering whatever information about the beetles we could find; images and whatever else we thought could be of use.

We sketched beetles from all different angles, turning them this way and that to understand their body parts and, much more importantly, how they fitted together. Small, handheld plastic models were very useful, especially when trying to draw a difficult and unusual angle. We quickly learnt something about their various colour combinations, differences between male and female, their varied environments, and all the tasks undertaken by these quite extraordinary, secret, tough little creatures.

This time was actually enjoyable because we too were learning about them, and there was a lot, actually heaps, that we didn't know, but needed to know if we were to go ahead and make drawings for the book.

The layout, we think, is simple, consistent and nicely interlaced. Nothing, hopefully, dominates or overshadows anything else. Our drawings of beetles with their distinct, shiny textured backs have a real tactile quality about them, so it just seems appropriate to draw any surrounding stems, leaves, or bark in a similar way, more or less.

Our beetles have personalities, but subtle enough to stay absolutely believable, and the encounters they have, with their own kind, or some other creature, lends some humour to the work, though very gentle. It was from drawing the caterpillar getting larger, and larger from one number to the next, and just getting really fat, content and sleepy by number ten. That just made sense, with all that it had eaten.

It was enjoyable too thinking up different scenarios for different beetles, which you try out, then scrap, then try again, before you hopefully settle on an idea that you both agree upon, that you can then develop and expand. When you are sketching, trying out a number of ideas, you can be as serious or as silly as you please. You have to start somewhere, and scribbling in your sketchpad can often be the most enjoyable part of doing a book. ~ HEATHER and MARK



The First Knowledges series for younger readers celebrates the wisdom and ingenuity of the First Peoples of this land. From baking the world's first bread to expertly managing *Country* so that everything had a chance to flourish, these books provide children with the building blocks to better understand our history and look to the future with fresh eyes. ***PAUL**





Unreal is a nonfiction book about telling the difference between fact and fake. It challenges readers to find the mythical creatures hiding among real-life animals and plants. When researching Unreal, I needed to find mythical and real creatures that seemed like they could be true, but might be fake.





When writing the chapter called *Healing Powers* about animals that can heal themselves of serious injuries, I had an idea for the mythical creature early on, but I was worried that kids would pick it as the myth straight away. But once I realised just how weird the real animals were, I stopped worrying. I ended up with a sea creature that shoots its innards out of its anus, a jellyfish that can live forever, a sea snake that grows back two heads when one is chopped off, an amphibian that can regrow pretty much any organ, and a flatworm that can rip itself in half and regrow from both ends. Like I said, telling fact from fake is harder than it sounds.

Of course, if it's going to be a challenge, the pictures also have to keep you guessing. When my publisher was looking for an illustrator, she wanted someone who could draw both real animals and mythical ones, with the same 'verisimilitude' (she's a publisher, so she always uses big words like that). What she meant was, she wanted each creature to look like it *could* be true but *might* be fake, just like the words say. I think Leila Rudge has done a really fabulous job on that front. While I love all of her illustrations, I think my favourite is one of Australia's most iconic animals - the drop bear. **~KATE**

The third is when we see the two combine into one, and the last two take unfinished elements of them all, to show the passing down of knowledge and care.



I really like my book trailer for *Grimsdon*, which my very clever partner helped make. We tried to create a sense of intrigue with the visuals and music, and tell enough of the story without giving too much away. It's only 30 seconds long but by the end, kids are often bursting to read the book.

HANDY HINTS FOR MAKING TRAILERS

Choose a book you like.

Decide the mood you'd like, and choose the music and images that help create that.

What is the hook for your trailer? Why should kids read the book? Hint at the characters and story, but don't give away any secrets or the ending!

My very clever partner, Todd, helps me make my trailers. I write the script, we both choose the music, and he comes up with the visuals. For *The Book of Wondrous*

Possibilities, he used the cover to make an animation, added some other graphics and headings.

We also asked a friend of ours who is a radio journalist to do the voiceover, and her voice is perfect! For the *Grimsdon* trailer, we used the cover and added a series of simple transitions, added text and powerful music that builds in tension.




Book Trailers: Hints for a great escape... holiday... trailer ???

- 1) *Keep it simple*. Sometimes book trailers are too complicated, with too much information, so you don't understand what is happening. Remember, book trailers are designed to make you *want* to read the book. So start by telling someone in only a few sentences what the book is about. And then, try making your book trailer focus on those few sentences you've just said.
- 2) *Be creative.* Make your trailer stand out from all the others by thinking outside the box. We LOVE seeing trailers that are unique and creative.
- 3) Leave the viewer wanting more. Don't spoil the ending. You want to hook the viewer and make them read the book to find out what happens next ... Focus your trailer on the set-up of the book.





Some book trailers look like ads for huge blockbuster Hollywood movies. Mine don't, which is a deliberate choice. Book trailers are supposed to match the tone of the book, and because my books are comedies, I make mine deliberately look bad to try and make people laugh.



For example, in this one for *Road Rage*, I had my son move alongside the car with branches and things, as though I'm driving past them. Of course, it doesn't look like I'm moving at all. Also, Chris Kennett, the illustrator, doesn't live near me, so I had to improvise ... https://nathanluff.com.au/book/family-disasters-road-rage/

I've done many kinds of writing.

I used to be a screenwriter and, before that, a journalist. Now, I'm an author. I also love to write rhyming poetry and have a few picture books under my belt. I love writing realistic stories that are funny, a little bit brutal and most of all, honest.

Sometimes, when I choose whether to read a book or not, after I'm intrigued by the cover, I'll turn the book over and read that little piece of writing on the back called the *blurb* to find out more. Is it an adventure? a mystery? a fantasy? or a relationshippy book? ...thrilling or cosy? Then, if I like the blurb, I move onto the first page and beyond.

If the blurb on the back cover doesn't match the story inside the book, I start to get cranky. It's a bit like ordering crispy fried chicken on a restaurant menu and getting served firecracker beef. Even if the beef is good, I'm disappointed...bBecause I expected crispy fried chicken.

Books need to do what they are supposed to do - even surprise you.

A book trailer is just like a blurb, except on film. It needs to accurately reflect the tone, ideas and characters inside the book. Otherwise, you are going to have some disappointed diners – oops, readers. ~ALEXA




