








Hello Readers!

My name is Nisaluk Chantanakom, but my friends call me Nis. I am an artist/illustrator and aspiring author. I've illustrated two picture books so far, with a third on the way! And a few bits and bobs of my own stories that I hope will be published one day.

I also work in primary schools, where I am part of a wonderful learning support team. I love seeing how teachers use books in the classroom. And it's always exciting when the creator of a story is one of my friends. The students know I am always curious about what they're reading and why they love it. Connecting with you, my readers, reminds me of how important it is to be a picture book illustrator — to create meaningful stories and beautiful artwork.

I would like to share with you how I made *A Teaspoon of Light,* a book on the CBCA Shortlist for the New Illustrator category, and *A Lemon for Safiya*, which recently came out on May 28th.

The two books are very different, but both explore memories. *A Teaspoon of Light* is about Marley, who has a dream cloth filled with old beautiful memories of her mother, grandmother, and home. When the cloth tears, she loses those memories and has to build new ones with her friends' help, and deal with grief by making new memories.

A Lemon for Safiya is about Safiya, who saw Myriam — an elderly Palestinian woman with dementia, looking helpless on the side of the road. As Safiya and her family kindly help Myriam, they discover her story and a gentle way of exploring the complex intersectionality of migration.

It was so interesting working on two books about memory at the same time! I made sure each had a unique art style. *A Teaspoon of Light* has a more muted palette and a classic, dream-like feel, influenced by old master artworks and a tonally darker book. I wanted a vibrant palette for *A Lemon for Safiya* to capture the bright blossoms of a lemon tree and a rougher texture compared to *A Teaspoon of Light*.

Before I even pick up a pencil, I dive deep into the story's words, soaking up its mood and emotions. Every book is different, and I find inspiration everywhere – sometimes from my own feelings, and sometimes from seeing things around me.

For *A Lemon for Safiya*, my own lemon tree in winter, bursting with bright yellow fruits, was a huge inspiration! I sketched its leaves, blossoms, and the texture of its peel. This led me to use crayons and rough-textured paper for the book's colours. The lemon itself became a visual thread connecting Myriam's present and her memories throughout the story.

My neighbour, an elderly Greek woman with dementia who often wandered into my backyard asking for lemons, also inspired how I drew Myriam. Seeing her confusion, I chose to show Myriam's memories as fragmented and childlike, using sketchy crayon marks and raw watercolours, contrasting them with the detailed, full-colour style of the present. It's a mixed-media project, combining many different art tools! I also love including little details from my life —like patterns from a Hebron tile I own, the super popular Squishmallows toy (Archie the Axolotl), and a pop-it fidget toy. Most of the inspiration came from what I

see working at schools. I know this story was based on Jemima's personal experience of her own act of kindness. I think it's a beautiful way for us as a community to remember those who can be easily

forgotten by our society.



I've included some of my sketches and favorite spreads here:



A **Teaspoon of Light** was a deeply personal project for me. After losing my mum, I immediately connected with Marley's story of loss. I researched how art can help heal from tough experiences, and this was deeply aligned with Peter's mission.



I wanted to create a diverse group of characters. Marley's dress was inspired by Mexican attire, Craig's by traditional Thai clothing



(my background), and Zyfer's by characters from The Little Rascals. I

used pencil, charcoal, and watercolour. These traditional media were then brought together digitally through collaging and painting in Photoshop. I even referenced Old Masters and architecture, such as Albrecht Dürer's "Adoration of the Magi" and the inverted tower, also known as the "initiation well," at Quinta da Regaleira in Portugal.

I hope that each book has its own unique visual style that is tailored to each special story! I can't tell you much about my third book, but it's definitely not about memories. However, it equally addresses 'Diversity' and is extra special and heartwarming. Until then!

Dragon Folding was a text that evolved very smartly. And it's all

because of Evan, our godson. Strolling to the local cafe with his family, he dropped his toy model As we picked up the pieces, he was a little distressed But then piped up "You can fix it", to which I replied something along the lines of "Not sure if I can". It was one of his fantabulous creations so it was not that easy for me to rebuild the way it should have been.

This continued at the cafe: "You can fix it" . . . "Not sure if I can" ... until eventually, I succumbed. And back at his house, together we created something that was not quite like his original, but was most satisfactory nonetheless. He did not complain, although it must be said that his dad does a better building job than I do.

So essentially, this is a story about my godson and me. And the dragons?

Well, that is an easy construction. Dragons have always been an integral part of me. The house I live in is filled to the rafters and beyond with dragons-in between the stairs, on ledges, you will find dragon sculptures, dragon pots, dragon vases, dragon illustrations (from my books, of course), dragon plates, dragon brooches, dragon pottery, dragon models, dragon carvings, and so many more DRAGONS. I'm yet to count them all, but I ache to because it was one of the questions I am repeatedly asked. The problem is that the dragons keep growing in number. A new one arrived just this past week!

And combine those two - the older man and a younger boy - along with absolutely glorious, regal and esteemed dragons, and there is the possibility for a new book.

Of course, there were a few questions that I asked myself: What would the characters be doing? Where would the action occur? What is the reason for all of this to happen? And the answer to all of this was something I always told my students when I was teaching, and I talk about now - If you're stuck, write about what you know!

In many of my more recent titles, the stories are about the everyday things that happen. And somewhere within the pages, sometimes hidden and sometimes on show, is a little bit of me. You might even find me, (possibly no more than a hint) in the storyline or the characters or maybe the illustrations.

And what's next? More dragons? Well, we just released *Powerful Like A Dragon* - another story I know really well. This story is not about me directly, but it is a family story, about MY family. It's real. My uncle (although he is actually my grandfather's brother's son - my first cousin once removed) first told us this story at our family reunion. And after he said my grandfather's name, I was hooked!

The Garden of Broken Things is a book that I both wrote and illustrated. I planned the drawings first and wrote the text afterwards. I've discovered I really like working this way. I love telling stories, but I'm not confident with the writing. So, this lets me focus first on the story without worrying about the words. And then, I can use the words to add to the story.

I was interested in telling this story because I'd had a lovely experience seeing my grandmother and my daughter together when my daughter was about 3 to 4 years old and my grandmother was about 98 to 99 years old! It was very obvious just how much my grandmother really came to life when she hung out with my daughter. And it made me realise how much a person's day can be improved just by having some interaction and companionship. I also have a fascination with old houses and properties that have been abandoned. They seem like scary places from the outside. In fact, they've just been forgotten and neglected, just like what can happen to some people. So, I felt like there was a correlation between these two

The setting was determined early on- a house and garden that had been forgotten for some time, with trees and vines already taking over. Sadie, the main character, had to be a curious child, but what developed as I was making the book was her chatty nature. I discovered that a lot of the text could be Sadie's chattiness, which I thought would be exactly what an old, forgotten person might really enjoy. ~ Freya



These Long-Loved Things is an extremely personal text for me. I was inspired by my own mother's struggle with Alzheimer's disease, which went on for about 10 years.

Sadly, she passed away last year, and along that whole journey, I had to try and explain what was happening to my own kids in terms that they could understand. My kids were quite young when Mum got sick, so there was a lot of explanation of really difficult concepts to them, and also to myself, in a way. I wanted to explain how shared memories, and the feeling of love remains, even when someone can't remember them anymore.

I also wanted to try and frame it with a bit of a reversal, where the child has become the teacher, and is leading the grandparent through this difficult time. I saw my own kids really rise to the occasion of helping and guiding their grandma with such care and empathy, and I wanted to explore that in the book too.~Josh



The inspiration for *We Live in a Bus* came from



travelling around the Australian outback towns of Winton, Hughenden and Richmond (commonly known as the Dinosaur Trail) in a Toyota Coaster bus in 2022. During the trip, I was talking with my agent, Annabel Barker, about creating a new book (for which I didn't have any ideas), and Annabel said, "Why don't you write about your adventures on the road?" And so, the idea was born.

I started putting together a list of all the things I'd experienced during the journey, from swimming in freezing waterholes and sleeping under the stars to playing on a musical fence in a small outback town called Winton. Queensland wildlife featured prominently in my notes, too: Lizards, dragonflies, flocks of budgies, red-tailed black cockatoos, frogs and baby emus... I could go on.

Before long, I had more than enough material to fill a 32-page picture book, in fact, I had so much that I could have written two books.

From there, the story and the characters developed pretty quickly. My approach was to try and bring a sense of curiosity about the world to every page. And I wanted to show the amazing tapestry of life that connects us all.

For me, We Live in a Bus is a celebration of the land and all the creatures that live on it.

I worked closely with Clair Hume and Fay Helfenbaum from Thames & Hudson, who helped pull it all together. I can't thank them enough for their guidance and support.

As for the illustrations, I use a mixture of traditional and digital. I work initially with graphite pencil, ink or oil paint to create the line work. Then, I scan everything. And assemble and colour it in Photoshop. Dave



Have you ever felt invisible, like you're standing in a crowded room, but no one truly sees you? That's the raw reality for Jonah, the young Indigenous protagonist of Gary Lonesborough's moving novel, I'm Not Really Here.

It is a tender and deeply human story about Jonah, a young Indigenous teen navigating grief, identity, and the feeling of being unseen in the world.

With the prominent theme of identity in the novel, it's interesting to see how the book works as both a mirror and a window for marginalised readers, reflecting the painful reality of feeling unseen; for others, it offers a clear view into the systemic challenges faced by Indigenous youth.

I'm Not Really Here isn't just to be read, it's to be felt. And maybe, after reading it, we'll all be a little better at truly seeing the people around us.

I really enjoyed writing this reflection. And reading this book. provided me a new insight into the systemic challenges faced by marginalised groups. I am even more pleased that this book won the award.

A Wreck of Seabirds by Karleah Olson (Fremantle Press) is a haunting, evocative novel. This novel is one that I highly enjoyed. It follows multiple storylines, with two missing girls, a young boy lost to the sea and their families learning to live without them. With clear description of the brooding shoreline and multifaceted ocean, its three perspectives in the layered structure showed the dangers and joys of the sea as well as hidden connections that bind a town

together, sewing threads of community and support.

The poignant writing style had emotional depth and enhanced the reading, pulling the reader in and not letting go. It is a young adult coastal-Gothic novel about delicate subjects, yet with hope woven through. Grief, memory, loss and learning to live without loved ones are key themes in this book.

The plot intrigued me, making me sit on the edge of my seat the whole time with the clear, haunting details and the constant theme of the fragile edge between grief and connection. I was desperate to find out what happened to the missing girls, Sarah and Aria, and whether Briony and Ren would overcome their sense of loss.

Every chapter was a cliffhanger, and you had no idea what would happen next. A Wreck of Seabirds shares with readers how harsh and unfair grief is, but also how new growth can sprout after loss. With its fragmented structure and its clear, lyrical detail, it shows how heavy the weight of absence is yet also the buoyancy of hope. I would recommend this book for readers who enjoy stories that explore difficult topics in a sensitive way, and anyone who likes novels that include narrative tension and a strong sense of place. While *A Wreck of Seabirds* has some bleak moments, it reminds us that the sun shines through.

The CBCA was founded in 1945, in a time when Australian children's books were few, and Australian authors and illustrators were virtually unknown.


The following year, in 1946, the Book of the Year Awards, (an annual award to promote books of high literary and artistic quality) was established.




The Story of Karrawingi the Emu is an
