HOW TO WRITE A BOOK WITH A FRIEND

BY **PENNY JAYE** (ONE HALF OF ELLA SHINE – AUTHOR OF THE PET SITTERS BOOKS)

Have you ever wanted to write a story with a friend? Me too! So last year I decided to write a brand - new series of books with my friend, **Cecily Ann Paterson** (you might already know her from books like **Lola in the Middle**).



Here are our top tips for writing with a friend:

#1 Write with someone who loves writing as much as you do! This helps keep the writing happening and shares the load. For the Pet Sitters books, Cecily and I made a good team because we both like writing fun stories for kids.

#2 Plan before you write – but not too much.

Before you start writing, plan the events of your story. Cecily and I planned **Tony Takes Off** while eating sushi in a food court! Make sure you write down your notes and then get writing.

#3 Work as a team.

Share all the writing tasks but remember the things you are good at. Cecily and I take turns to write each chapter, but we're good at different things. Cecily is better at spelling and I come up with more crazy ideas.

#4 Decide on your author name! Cecily and I decided to publish our *Pet Sitter* stories under the pen name **Ella Shine**.

Will you use your own names, a combination, or something totally different?

WAYS WITH WORDS

A **PEN NAME** is a name made up by and author to use instead of their real name.



THE NERD HERD by **Nathan Luff** and **Chris Kennett**, **Illustrator Scholastic** Barny the lamb and his friends are sick of being picked on, so they decide to form a gang to show everyone that they are not as soft as they look. But how do three fluffy friends stand up to a cunning fox, a gigantic cat, and a bull with behavioural issues?

Nathan and Chris respond to each other's initial wording and illustrations to work "together but apart" to reshape their characters so they "fit" and grow in the stories.

Recently they have combined their talents to create **The Nerd Herd,** a highly illustrated junior fiction series.



NERDS UNITE! by NATHAN LUFF AND CHRIS KENNETT

NATHAN:

Writing an illustrated book is an interesting type of collaboration. Although Chris and I aren't in the same room and our correspondence filters through our publishing team, we are still very much working together (just apart). Our editor, Laura, and designer, Elly, are also integral collaborators on these books.

When writing, I don't think about what the specific illustrations will be, but I am always thinking about the visual *potential* of

each moment. If there is too much sitting around and talking, I need to add some slapstick, so Chris isn't just drawing talking heads.

I try to work in as many visual gags as I can—often this involves the characters looking ridiculous—and in these situations, the words deliver the set-up, and the illustrations deliver the punch line. I can make illustration notes for Chris, but I rarely do unless there is something unspoken that he needs to understand (such as Barny lying to the reader). I'm more interested in what Chris's ideas are and how he interprets the story and characters.

When writing book 1, I had my own ideas about what the setting and characters looked like but with the latest manuscripts, I now have Chris's illustrations in my head, so that does influence the story, especially the way the various locations now look.



CHRIS:

People often imagine the Author/Illustrator relationship as a constant collaboration, where the two get together and bounce ideas off each other, over coffee and cakes. And while that can be true in some cases, the reality is we're often separated by cities, states and sometimes, even countries. Which is a shame, because I *really* like coffee and cake.

So. bringing someone else's characters to life, without them in the room is a huge responsibly. *Ultimately, I want to do justice to Nathan's characters and words, while still bringing my own ideas to the table.*

The first time I see the actual manuscript, it has already been laid out by the designer (Elly) with spaces left throughout, for my artwork. This serves as a great template for me to draw directly into the manuscript. Which means I already have a good sense of how the finished pages will come together.

That's not to say I don't have any freedom to experiment. I'm always given room to play around with the layout, mix up the ideas or move text around if I need to. Now we have the first book under our belts, we've got a great formula for books 2 and 3, which I can't wait to share!

FROM SKETCH TO FINISHED ILLUSTRATION WITH CHRIS KENNETT (based on illustrations from The Nerd Herd)

1: Rough drawings directly into the manuscript



2: Clean up line art and shading.



3: Spot colour added and the designer finalises text placement.





WAYS WITH WORDS COLLABORATE – to plan and work together on a particular project.

PODDY'S JUMPER by Patricia Bernard and Krista Brennan, Illustrator *Five Senses Education*

This is Patricia's third picture book along with **PODDY AND THE TWO-HEADED SNAKE** and **PODDY'S BACKWARDS ADVENTURE.** She normally writes primary and teenage adventure, fantasy, and science fiction.

When Patricia heard a newscast of the devastating effects of a freezing drought on our rural communities, she knew it was a story that had to be told. The personal stories from the community members contributed plenty to the telling. And the initial story grew.





SHARING STORIES of DROUGHT AND JUMPERS WITH PATRICIA BERNARD

The story of **PODDY'S JUMPER** began when I heard an interview on ABC radio. A farmer, named Marie Knight, was telling the interviewer of how she lived on a huge sheep

station near Coonabarabran, New South Wales, where there has been a drought for six years. Many videos have captured the impact of the drought [example: DAY ZERO: The Australian Drought Crisis <u>https://tinyurl.com/y293fdrv</u>]

There was no grass, just red sand, dead trees and freezing cold winters. Marie told how she had to buy hay and for the sheep. Each morning after she has fed and watered the sheep, she collected the new-born lambs that the mother sheep couldn't feed.



Some days, she picked up twenty lambs. She put them beside her kitchen fire and fed them milk from babies' bottles. But they were still cold. So, she started knitting lamb jumpers. She shared the knitting pattern with friends, who sent it to their friends. Knitters from Australia, New Zealand, England, Scotland and Canada were sending lambs' jumpers to her farm. Soon she had so many jumpers that she sold them to other farmers and donated the money to the 'Lamb Jumpers Helping Farmers Charity.' She helped so many farmers that she was given the Australian Order of Merit.

I telephoned Marie Knight to ask if I could write her story in a picture book. She said yes. Then, I researched the drought with other outback farmers.



Next problem – How to fit Marie's story into a picture book format of 29 pages and 400 words. It became easier, because, being a true story, it almost wrote itself. I found an illustrator who could draw sheep and people. I sent her photographs of Merino lambs because they are different to other lambs.

Then, I had to find a publisher who liked my story and Krista Brennan's illustrations. The publisher wanted a book that showed Australian children how hard it was to live in a drought area.

Writing a picture book takes a long time because it takes



longer to draw 28 pictures than it took me to write the story. *PODDY'S JUMPER* will be published in March.

HELPING OUR FARMERS – AN UPDATE BY MARIE KNIGHT



Just like my grandmother, I have always used jumpers on our poddies. Like human babies, newborn lambs need help to control their body temperature.

I normally have 4 poddy lambs every year, but during the drought of 2017, I had 25, so my mother's knitting group helped me out. As more stories and photos came out on social media, I offered my extra jumpers to

anyone that would like them. The very day I offered them, I had requests for 100 jumpers.

I spoke with a friend on ABC Rural radio to see if others would like to help knit jumpers for lambs to help drought affected farmers. We started the *Lamb Jumpers Facebook* page. In one week, I received over 700 knitted jumpers to send out to farmers. I was amazed at the need and the generosity of spirit of both farmers and our supporters.

International groups are now helping their local farmers. Over 140,000 jumpers have been given to farmers all over Australia. Even during Covid-19, our supporters thank me for helping them feel connected to our Lamb Jumpers community and farmers.



WAYS WITH WORDS

Poddy - the animals we hand raise – poddies - have a fat belly as they are bottle feed. I didn't know until **Lamb Jumpers** that we are the only country to call them Poddies. They can be hand raised for many reasons. Drought meant more lambs than ever before needed help as many mothers were

not strong enough to look after them. I had farmers caring for 200 which meant lots of time and work, also lots of fun and love. – Marie

Are you excited about all the new books in your library? How many will you read in Term 1? Here's a couple of ideas to settle you back into library land –

• Why not set yourself a target of books to read and then challenge your friends to beat you! This is a terrific chance to read some new books, re-visit your favourites and maybe even finish that exciting series that you started last year

STUART MCGRATH - **NT** - Stuart McGrath is an Aboriginal health practitioner and will become the first Yolngu registered nurse. He has helped produce the 'Ask the Specialist' pod cast to improve communication between health professionals and patients.

DANIEL & WILLIAM CLARKE are passionate conservationists who have raised more than \$900,000 for the endangered orangutans.

TAYLA HARRIS - VIC is a talented athlete in AFLW football and boxer who is a powerful advocate for respectful relationships through her work with **Our Watch**, an organisation working to prevent violence against women. Her co-authored 2020 book, '**More Than a Kick'**, provides advice to young people on how to navigate social media and deal with online bullying.

TOBY THORPE - TAS has worked tirelessly for youth empowerment and climate action. Through his Climate Justice Initiative, which runs in-school workshops, he is helping young people understand how to make a difference to the world.

GRACE FORREST - **WA** is the founding director of **Walk Free**, an international human rights' organisation working to eradicate modern slavery. She has been was appointed the United Nations Association of Australia's youngest-ever Goodwill Ambassador, for Anti-Slavery.
